Editorial

Many years ago there used to appear in newspapers – at least in the UK – a strange-looking picture. These pictures weren't in every day, but would appear occasionally as a kind of *diversion* for people.

These pictures looked really odd – just a half-page of colors and blotches, with nothing but a vague clue to give you the idea of what it is you should be seeing.

But ... if you stared *into* this mass of blobs and colors, and if you focused your eyes *a certain way*, all of a sudden an incredibly rich 3-dimensional image would appear, and you would instantly understand the vague clue. And once you'd *seen* that image, you could no longer *unsee* it – and you'd wonder how it was that you were never able to see it before!

These images, commercially known as 'Magic Eye' pictures (but properly known as 'autostereo-grams'), were originally developed to study human depth perception. And that is what you have to do to reveal the image: focus beyond the image so that you actually see what is really there.

During a sermon about the Beatitudes (which means 'blessings'), given by St. Gregory of Nyssa (335-394 A.D.) he said that when Jesus proclaimed the blessings one finds in the Beatitudes (Matt 5:3-12; Luke 6:20-22), He wasn't just giving people a list of impossible virtues, but was actually letting the people know the blessings that were being made available to them.

St. Gregory focuses on Jesus' "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God" and comments: "So magnificent a consummation is offered to our hope in the promise made in this Beatitude. But since, as has been shown before, the seeing has been made dependent on purity of heart, my mind once more grows dizzy, lest perhaps purity of heart should be impossible to achieve because it surpasses our nature".

I would reckon that most of us feel this way! But St. Gregory continues: "Yet should the Lord command something so great that it completely surPurity of heart means to let go of all negativity, let go of jaded ways of viewing everything, and to trust God to show you the way things really are.

passes our nature and the limits of its power? Surely not. He does not tell those he had not provided with wings to become birds, nor does he bid creatures he has destined to sojourn on land to live in the water."

So ... according to St. Gregory, seeing God, although it requires of us purity of heart isn't something that is beyond us, but it is something that makes a demand on us.

And what is this 'purity of heart' of which Jesus spoke? Well ... it isn't a kind of naïve simplicity within a person – something we might find in the person of the movie version of Forest Gump. No – naïvety isn't involved; only a new way of looking at the world.

Back in the day of Jesus, the heart was understood to be the seat of the emotions. Purity of heart means to let go of all negativity, let go of jaded ways of viewing everything, and to trust God to show you the way things *really are*.

Just as those Magic Eye pictures required of us a *new way* of viewing a flat page in order for a whole new 3D world to be revealed, so God requires of us that we look at the world in a *new way* – one in which we see the Creator of all in *everything*.

This *isn't* as easy as it sounds –it takes a *whole lot* of practice. A continuous lifetime, to be exact.

But once you begin to look into and beyond creation, you will catch tiny glimpses of ... well ... nothing ever seems the same again, and you can never unsee those images. And it affects you in every part of your being, making your heart sing, and your mind amazed in wonder.

Apparently, the first thing you *are* to do is buy that book. See how that works, peeps???

These comments were all about the comment-ers opinions about why church growth wasn't and a growing member, too. happening or, to be more precise, were all about why churches were shrinking.

Here are a couple of representative examples: "lieing, false doctrine, hypocracy, respect of persons, sugar coating, no wait just one moment, these are the five things that gauretee a huge following!" and "Our bodies are the temple of the living God and the church of Christ is spirit now God can only be worshipped in spirit and in truth" (spelling and punctuation (or lack of) are in the originals).

I kept on reading until I got to the final comment, and as I read, I saw a pattern emerging and - I have to tell you peeps – it wasn't a pretty pattern.

The first pattern I saw was that there wasn't one comment that was positive – all of them dissed the church, and the peeps in them.

I have to ask you: what is your motivation for attending a church? I'm sure there are many motivations – some of them negative (if you were being honest with yourself) - but I would reckon that most of you peeps go for honorable reasons - if not saintly ones.

Of course, the *correct* answer would be something like: "Through my faith in Christ I know that God has called me to be a member of His Body here in this place."

Along with that confession are lots of implications regarding being a working member of that Body,

Now I *know* you peeps are not perfect – believe me, I know because I live with such an imperfect specimen. But spiritual growth means that you do not stay where you are in your imperfection; you move towards God, becoming more like Him.

And that – in a nutshell – is the spiritual life.

The second pattern I saw in the comments, dear peeps, was this: every single comment was about 'they', 'you' 'the church'.

It would seem that all those comment-ers were all well-sorted, ready-for-heaven peeps. It was everyone else who was the problem. If only one peep had said something like "I know I fail to show Christ in my life sometimes ..." then that would have made all the difference.

Because that's it, really, isn't it, peeps? The reason why you creatures have such hands as you do is to remind you that, when you point your finger at someone, there are three others pointing straight back at you.

Give it a click!


ANNOUNCING St. Clement's Women's Summer Book Reading

TRINITY CAFÉ NEWS

On Saturday June 24th we had 7 volunteers from St. Clement's go to Trinity Café to serve breakfast to the hungry and homeless of Tampa Bay. We also took an estimated 200 lbs. plus of donated food with us which, as usual, was gratefully received.

There was a steady stream of hungry people coming through the doors and they were most appreciative of the hearty breakfast they received: cereal and milk followed by a Spanish-style omelet, thick sliced ham and plenty of it, breakfast potatoes, a pastry, and fresh croissants served at the table with spread and jam. Hot coffee, hot chocolate, iced tea or iced water were served to wash it all down. They also each took with them a large bag of chips. Usually a piece of fresh fruit is also given to everyone but there was none available on Saturday. A total of 253 people were served that day.

You can see from this menu for just one day how much food is consumed – and Trinity provides a hot nutritious meal seven days a week – lunch every week day at two locations, and breakfast on Saturday and Sunday at one location. Every donation of food or money is vital and put to good use. They also could not do what they do without the hundreds, if not thousands, of volunteer hours that people give over the course of each year. So however you give and whatever you give, thank you!!

Worship Commissioner Karen Western will be issuing Server Challenges as part of a major effort to recruit more servers. She will be arranging training and get-togethers for the servers.

Nursery – The Nursery (in the Chapel during construction) is for children 4 and under only. For both legal and safety reasons, children 5

Parish Hall/CE Building Renovation

The Christian Education Building and Parish Hall are now construction sites. Please do not enter these buildings.

Fair Trade – St C has begun testing one kind of *Fair Trade* coffee. This is the first step to our becoming a *Fair Trade Parish*.

Third Quarter Loose Plate Cash – Outreach Commissioner Jerry Dillehay announced that cash offerings given in the third quarter will go to Inspire Equine Therapy Group.

Pet Memorial Garden – Schematics for the garden were presented to the Vestry. It will be in the courtyard area, outside the Parish Hall. The garden will include a pergola, St. Francis statue, benches, engraved memorial bricks, mosaics, sitting walls and more.

Estate Tithe – At the September meeting, Vestry members will submit and discuss concrete proposals for StC's 10% tithe of the Mildred Hawk estate.

Digital Strategy Initiative – The Vestry agreed to extend StC's Search Engine Optimization & Social Media contract with The Creative Stable through March, 2018. This includes online ads for our major events during that period.

Annual Vestry Retreat – This year's retreat will be at St. Vincent Episcopal Church in St. Pete on Saturday, July 8.

Breakfast at Trinity Café

She was the last person I served on Saturday – thin, wiry, mid 50's or so, wearing a yellow tank top and cropped pants. She asked if Trinity were still giving away



packets of coffee. Earlier in the month, she and her friends had laughed when they saw the packets on the take-away shelf. What would we do with those? "But now," she beamed, "I can perk coffee. I have a place to live. I am so blessed."

She was homeless for 25 days. Every day she prayed, asking God to find her a home. And then, one day, she changed her prayer. "I asked God to send an angel to help me know what to do." That day, a man in a wheelchair passed her on the sidewalk. He stopped and they talked. He offered her a rental in his building. She said she couldn't move in until her disability check came, on July 3rd. He told her she could move in right away and pay later; he would charge her \$250 a month. She said that wasn't enough – it was worth at least \$400. They settled on \$300.

"That night," she said, "I prayed harder than I've ever prayed before – to thank God. I am so blessed."
