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BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS

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Editorial

30th Anniversary

Be praised, my Lord, through all your creatures.
-- St. Francis of Assisi

On October 7, St. Clement's will host its Blessing of the Animals Celebration for the 30th time. In our church at Noon, we will seek the spirit of St. Francis as we – together with our animals – join in a hymn of thanksgiving to God.

Before and after the Worship Service, crowds of animals and people will share in the festival atmosphere. This will be much larger than the first Blessing of the Animals, celebrated at St. Clement's on October 9, 1988, but its essence will not have changed: as we honor our fellow creatures, we honor God the Creator; as we seek His Blessing for our animals, we act as stewards of His Creation.

Tradition

Eight hundred years ago, not long after St. Francis delivered his celebrated sermon to the birds at Bevagna, the Hospitallers of St. Anthony began blessing the pigs they raised and sold to support their charitable work. The order bore the name of St. Anthony the Abbot (250-356), who forswore all his worldly possessions to live as a hermit in the Egyptian desert, with only livestock for company. Legend has it that he gathered the animals together to join him as he worshiped God. In the Roman Catholic Church, St. Anthony is considered a founder of Christian monasticism and a protector of livestock and farm animals.

The tradition of blessing animals made its way to the New World with Franciscan Friars, who came to rural Mexico in the 16th Century. The emphasis remained on blessing farm animals, as it does today in rural Mexico. The celebration came to the United States in the 1930s, to Olvera Street, the heart of the original Pueblo of Los Angeles, where the annual animal blessing is still held each spring in honor of St. Anthony.

To this day, the Vatican hosts annual Blessing of the Animals celebrations in January for the Feast Day of St. Anthony. These celebrations, which concentrate on blessing livestock, emphasize the agricultural roots of the tradition.

Transformation

The past three decades have seen a major transformation – our animals now join us in celebration of the Feast Day of St. Francis, in October. We bring them into our churches, for blessing and to share in our worship. This transformation has brought dramatic growth: in thirty years, Blessing of the Animals celebrations have spread to all 50 states and have become part of mainstream American culture – thanks to the inspiration and leadership of the Episcopal Church.

The change began in 1985 at the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine in New York City. As the 20th Century waned, people's relationship to their animals had changed: far fewer people had farm animals and far more had pets. At the same time, growing concern about the environment focused renewed attention on St. Francis of Assisi, whose love of nature reflected his view of all Creation as God's divine gift.

New York City's Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine brought an increased focus to the Feast Day of St. Francis in 1981, when it commissioned an Earth Mass – Missa Gaia – to be performed annually on St. Francis Day. Composer Paul Winter wove together music from the Episcopal liturgy, including the Kyrie and Agnus Dei, with hymns and calls of whales, wolves and other animals.

On October 6, 1985, the three-ton brass doors of St. John the Divine opened to the strains of Missa Gaia and a procession of animals, led by Minnie the elephant, entered the largest Anglican cathedral in the world. As the animals processed — the llama, the monkey, the eagle, the horse, the macaw, and many more — silence came over the great cathedral and many in the congregation, sitting with their own animals, wept. In Francis's vision, the entire created order joined in a hymn of thanksgiving to God; there, on the upper west side, the spirit of St. Francis came to life.

Within three years, St. Clement's Episcopal Church embraced the new Blessing of the Animals celebration -- one of the first Episcopal churches to do so. Each year, we seek to bring the Spirit of St. Francis to life, to join in worship with our animals, to see God in all His Creation.

Why 'good', dad? If I were you, I'd pray for 'indifferent' weather – you know, a bit of a breeze to waft the scents; brisk clouds clipping by overhead, allowing Brother Sun to peep out now and then; and a temperature that won't make me want to throw my head into my water bowl.

(Ed: you've got it!)

If only it were that simple, if only – but time will tell! Speaking of 'Brother Sun' gives me the opportunity to remind y'all to make sure you peeps are guarded against his power – via sunscreen and sunshades – and that those creatures whom you accompany are equally protected.

After all ...

NO - I have to say it!

After all, Saturday is the bestest day ever, because we celebrate FRANKIE BABE!!!!!!!!!!

(Ed: <groan>)

HA! DAD! You can't keep joy down – not that you'd know anything about joy, being an old misery – it will 'out', no matter who tries to stop it.

It's like Jesus when He made His way into Jerusalem – what you peeps call 'The Triumphal Entry'. Luke says:

As soon as He was approaching, near the descent of the Mount of Olives, the whole crowd of the disci-

ples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the miracles which they had seen, shouting:

"Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord;

Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!"

Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to Him, "Teacher, rebuke Your disciples." But Jesus answered, "I tell you, if these become silent, the stones will cry out!" (Luke 19:37-40)

Even the STONES! The Pharisees are the miserable ones: they look, but can't see anything to be joyful about; they listen, but they can't hear creation singing in harmony to its Creator. How sad!

To find joy in something isn't a personal event; it is something that brings you into deep communion not only with God, but with all His creation. We were made to sing together as one – the wolf with the lamb, the leopard with the goat, and a young boy ahead leading them. It should be a young girl though, 'cos you male peeps have absolutely no sense of direction.

But that's the beauty and *awesomeness* of Frankie Babe: *he 'got it'!* He saw the *'oneness'* of all creation, and witnessed to God's care for all creatures – even when others *couldn't see it:*

We hope that you will take advantage of this new way of aiding your church. For more details contact the Parish Office.




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

Lesson



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
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

In and Out

And if he refuses to hear them, tell it to the church. But if he refuses even to hear the church, let him be to you like a gentile and a tax collector. -Matthew 18:17

Church discipline. That's what I was told this text was about. The explanation was satisfactory for a while because it appealed to something within me. I liked being justified, being proven that I am right. I liked those who did not listen to me to suffer the consequences. This text sounded like a perverted promise to my base instincts. People get what they deserve, being sent out into the wilderness so to speak because they refused to change. However, times have changed and I have changed. Now we are in the wilderness. We discovered that this text isn't about discipline but about love. The wilderness where the Gentiles and tax collectors lived is not a place of abandonment. It is where Jesus dwelt. It is a place of discovery.

Gentiles and Tax collectors. Jesus was known to be a friend of the tax collectors. He sought them out. He had dinners at their homes. The religious authorities said that he drank too much with them. They did not like his association with them. They thought that tax collectors should be ignored and despised so that they could learn the errors of their ways. Jesus thought differently. He thought that tax collectors were to be treated more delicately and with much grace.

The religious authorities thought that the Gentiles were excluded from the promises of redemption. They were irrelevant as far as the Kingdom of God was concerned. Jesus hardly said anything about Gentiles. He had sufficient interactions with them to reveal His true attitude towards them. He sought a lonely man who lived in a cemetery in a Gentile territory. This strange fellow liked cutting himself with rocks and was violent and terrifying. The people preferred to chain him in the land of the dead. This is where he belonged, they thought. Jesus went despite the fact that this was a land where pigs dwelled. It was not a place for any religious Jewish leader of His time. Jesus thought it was important to go to this unclean land to heal this abandoned young man. The fact that he was a Gentile did not hinder him.

There was another Gentile that Jesus praised, he was a centurion. A military officer of a people who oppressed the Jewish people. He was the enemy and yet, Jesus commended his faith. It was greater than anyone He met among His own religious people. There was another despised Gentile woman who won an argument with Him. She showed Jesus that faith is able to overcome boundaries. Strangely, the gospel never talks about bad Gentiles.
